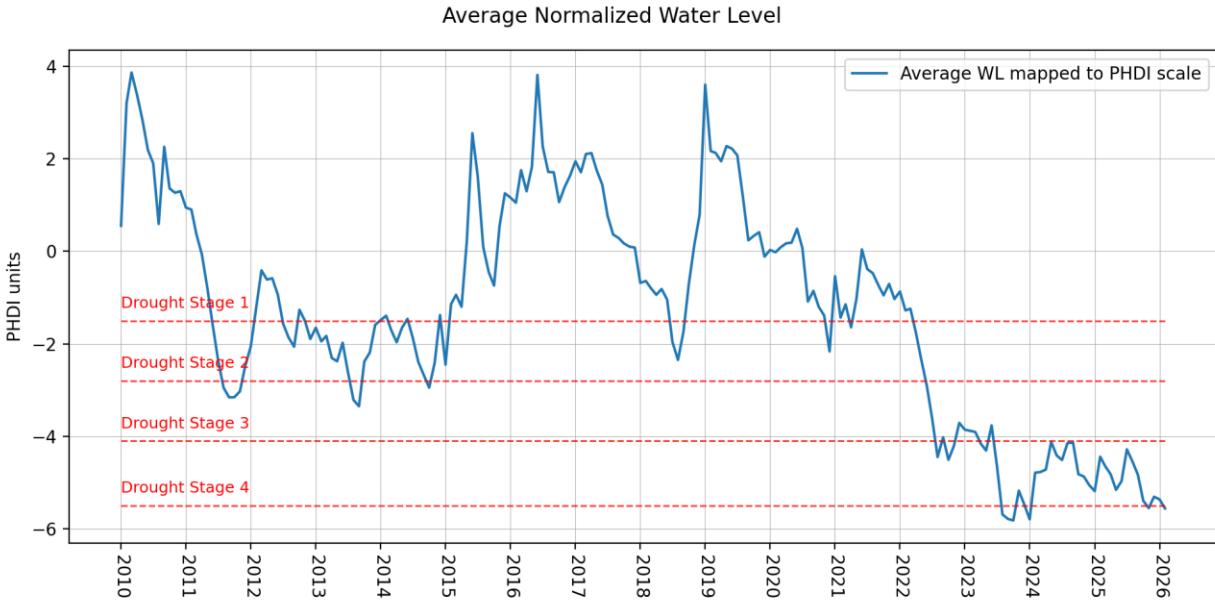

Blanco-Pedernales Groundwater Conservation District Announces Escalation to Drought Stage 4

Johnson City, TX — Feb. 19, 2026 — The Blanco-Pedernales Groundwater Conservation District (BPGCD) today announced that, following a unanimous vote by the Board of Directors, the district is officially moving from Drought Stage 3 to Drought Stage 4, effective immediately. This escalation reflects the continued decline in groundwater levels across the district and the heightened risk to municipal, agricultural, and residential water supplies.

Current Conditions

- **Monitoring-Well Data:** The latest aggregate analysis of the district’s network of monitoring wells (see the below graph entitled, “Average Normalized Water Levels”) shows a sustained drop in water tables, pushing the average water level below the threshold defined for Drought Stage 4 in the Blanco-Pedernales Drought Index (BPDI).
- **BPDI Model:** The BPDI model, which integrates the regional Palmer Hydrologic Drought Index (PHDI), now classifies the district’s overall water status as **severe** (Stage 4), indicating that water levels are critically low and that existing supplies may not meet essential demand without additional conservation measures.



Stage 4 Restrictions and Compliance Guidelines

Conservation Goal: 50% + reduction in groundwater use

Usage Reduction Measures:

- Continue, or increase, voluntary reduction in various uses
- Check for and correct all plumbing leaks
- No outside watering of lawns, trees, shrubs, or gardens
- No vehicle washing
- No washing of buildings, driveways, streets, patios, or other outdoor surfaces except as required for human or animal health and safety needs, or for fire prevention
- Watering for dust control only when required by law
- Livestock watered in leak-proof troughs only
- Providing groundwater to ponds, lakes, tanks, reservoirs, or other surface impoundments for holding water is prohibited.



Community Impact

The District urges all residents and businesses to take immediate steps to conserve water and comply with Stage 4 drought restrictions. These measures are essential to protect remaining water resources and ensure availability for critical needs.
